Greetings! Swabodhini School for Special children is wholly owned and as a single purpose is managed by the Swabodhini Charitable Trust. We currently have 60 plus students with autism and related challenges under the school system, vocational skill training and also utilizing the therapy services provided by the school.

The school as well as the Vocational Centre is registered with the Tamil Nadu State Government.

We take this opportunity to share the important milestones for the school in 2017-18.

Who We Are

Established in 1989, Swabodhini Charitable Trust wholly and as a single purpose manages the special school and the vocational training centre for students with autism and related challenges. At our special school, apart from providing special education and training, we also provide speech therapy, occupational therapy services, yoga, fitness therapy & MNRI. Young adults are given employability skill training in 4 main vocational areas –computer skills, office administration skills, retail skills and culinary skills. Our students also get trained in the making of vocational products such as diyas, paper cups, paper bags etc.

We aspire to be the leading institution in special needs training and education.


Our Mission

Swabodhini provides high quality education and structured training and therapy services. In partnership with parents and society, we empower individuals to reach their potential for all –round development and transition them to sheltered or open employment, thus enabling them to lead an independent life with dignity in mainstream society.

SWABODHINI AT A GLANCE

The core of Swabodhini is our students. Our purpose and focus is to transform the lives of students with autism and related challenges and help them lead an independent & dignified life. We do this through **Special education**, **Therapy & Vocational skills training** – which are the 3 key functional areas of Swabodhini. In this annual report, we will look at the key highlights in these 3 areas for the academic year 2017-18

This year we had 21 new admissions, taking our overall student strength to 60 –a 27% increase over last year. Swabodhini believes in quality special education for all and facilitates sponsorship through the trust. 25% of our student strength are sponsored.





Students on the autism spectrum do not experience the world in the same way we expect, of most children who are in the Early Years stage of development and learning. It is therefore critical that each pupil has a regular, predictable and structured learning environment in order to set them up for success as they move through school life.

The Special Education plan in Swabodhini is designed to ensure that students with special needs are provided with the environment that allows them to be educated effectively. We have a well-developed curriculum for functional math, science, english and activities of daily living.

Teaching methodology


Acknowledging the importance of an education plan and to keep up with the recent trends, during the academic year 2017-2018, we modified the teaching concept at

Swabodhini. We moved from a class teacher concept to subject teacher concept. Under the new teaching concept, each teacher handled only one subject with a duration of 45 minutes per class. Earlier, a single teacher handled a class all through the day and the same teacher taught the various subjects. This shift now helped the teacher prepare a comprehensive lesson and teach the students with a lot of focus and clarity.

Further, with the support of our education consultant, the academic curriculum was consolidated and a systematic lesson plan for education implementation was introduced.

Every student has an Individual Education Plan at Swabodhini as we understand that each student is unique. The students were taught functional academics through activities of daily living. This helps the student to succeed in real-life situations at home, school, work and in the community.





We also made our term end assessment of the students more streamlined by introducing the grading system. This helped us to quantify the student's progress and work on areas of improvement with a clear goal.

Special Education Infrastructure Additions

Swabodhini prides itself on providing a bright and stimulating learning environment. Going by this standard, in the year 2017-18, we added a new class in the Primary section to accommodate additional students. Additionally a science corner was set up for the primary students having simple experiments which helps the students to experientially understand the concepts that they learn in class.



We also took time to celebrate milestone achievements in the life of our students at our Graduation day which is an important occasion at Swabodhini. We had our second Graduation day celebrations on 11 August 2017 at the Music Academy. Mr. Ampa Palaniappan, MD of Ampa Housing Development Private Limited was the chief guest for the occasion.

8 students graduated, out of which 5 graduated in-school and 3 graduated out of the school.

- Primary to pre vocational: Master R. Gurudas and Master R. Deepak
- Pre vocational to Vocational: Mr. M. Praveen Kumar, Mr. S. Amruth and Mr. V.V. Abhishek Rao
- Vocational graduates: Mr. Mahesh Ram, Mr. B. Vishwanath and Mr. V Venkat Naraendar

Swabodhini takes pride in saying that all the 3 vocational graduates, graduated out of Swabodhini with an internship / placement in mainstream work place.

Parent Teacher Meet

Providing regular feedback to parents about students and their learning is an important aspect of maximizing student achievement. Parent Teacher meetings which were structured and focused were conducted each month at Swabodhini.

Parents had a chance to interact with the class teachers on the last working day of every month. Our parents also had the opportunity to interact with the staff and the Director over the course of academic year during term end progress review of the students & also one whole week in the month of April 2018, to discuss the progress of their children. Detailed discussions were held with the parents and the development of the child through the year were shared with them. We received positive feedback from our parents on this initiative and the work done.



For the overall development of the student, therapies are crucial. A student in the spectrum gets equipped to navigate his everyday life with independence trough regular therapies.

Swabodhini offers the following therapy services for its students.



S No	Therapy	Group / One on One	Purpose
1	Occupational Therapy	One on One	Focuses on sensory integration and helps students gain functional independence in all facets of life. Done by qualified therapists.
2	Speech Therapy	One on One	Focuses on enhancing communication skills. Done by qualified therapist.
3	Yoga Therapy	Group	Asanas, pranayama and auto suggestion to help calm the students down. Classes taken by certified yoga trainer with experience in special needs from Satyananda Yoga Center, Triplicane.
4	Movement Therapy	Group	Fun, empowering sensory integration strategy that connects the left and right hemispheres of the brain by combining patterning, visual movement calculation, audile receptive processing, rhythm and sequencing into a "whole brain" cognitive thinking approach to significantly improve behavioral, emotional, academic, social and speech and language skills. RASA Centre for theatre arts and special needs conduct the movement therapy classes at Swabodhini.
5	Fitness therapy	Group	Enhancing movement, coordination, strength and stability. Classes taken by qualified fitness trainer.
6	Music Therapy	Group	To improve attention span, promote vocal communication, reduce behavior challenges. Tie up with Bombay Jayashree's Hitham Trust.
7	Group communication	Group	To improve peer group interaction and social skills. Lead by therapists.
8	MNRI	One on One	Neurosensory Motor and reflex integration therapy. Done by certified therapists.

Speech and occupational therapy are the most crucial of the one on one therapies and is a standard, proven therapies for improvement of students in the spectrum. Below is the process of how we determine if a student requires therapy and how the therapy is done.


Assessment of the student to check if therapies are required (assessment by therapists / special educators / inputs from parents and teachers)

Set therapy goals and design therapy plan for the students.
One on One speech and occupational therapy by experienced therapists

Evaluation of progress for Goals Vs actuals. Set new goals aimed at further improvement. If desired level of progress attained, student is weaned from therapy



We can see below how the speech and OT therapy sessions has increased over the years at Swabodhini. This stands as a testimonial to the quality of therapy services provided at Swabodhini.



Therapy updates 2017-18

We have introduced 3 new therapies at Swabodhini.

Fitness Therapy







NEED

Fitness is essential for overall well being for all. Our students are no exception. For our adolescents in the spectrum, with energy to burn off but no peer group to play with, fitness therapy was identified as a key to manage behavior challenges.

PURPOSE

Fitness therapy was designed in such a way that it is aimed at improving the strength, stamina, stability, flexibility of our students. Adolescents in the spectrum have a tendency to put on weight due to their sedentary life style, with no avenues to regularize the harmonal changes that happen at that age.

FITNESS THERAPY

BENEFITS

With regular functional fitness sessions, conducted twice a week for one hour, we found a marked improvement in the food, sleep and behavior patterns in our students. Their stamina increased and their gross motor skills also improved.

NO. OF STUDENT BENEFICIARIES: 20

Music Therapy

Weekly listening sessions conducted by trained Carnatic musicians from Hitham Trust – founded by eminent Carnatic singer Ms. Bombay Jayashri.



NEED

Music has the power to transform our moods and emotions. It is also proven to work as a therapuetic tool. For the students in the spectrum, music calms, soothes and also promotes verbal communication.

PURPOSE

Music therapy improves the sitting tolerance of the students in the spectrum, balances audio sensory input processing and also reduces aggressive and self harming behaviours.

MUSIC THERAPY

BENEFITS

Through regular music therapy, we have found that even non-verbal students start humming the tunes of the songs they listen, keep the rythm and enjoy the music.

Music therapy has also positively impacted the students' attention and focus in academics and skill training.

MNRI Therapy

Masgutova Neurosensory Motor and Reflex Integration (MNRI) is one of the most sought after approaches in the world for autism, hyperactivity and cerebral palsy. Swabodhini offers MNRI twice a week for students who need additional intervention.

NEED

There are minimum of eight reflexes that are found to be not integrated with kids with autism and if these are integrated then these children started improving in the areas where they were having issues and difficulties

PURPOSE

Reflexes are assessed whether they are integrated, resurfaced, opposing, absent or non integrated.

The therapy is then given to address the reflexes which then integrates the neuronal connections.

MNRI THERAPY

BENEFITS

MNRI reduces hypertonic rigidity can begin to relax clenched fists, rigid arms and/or legs. Sensory defensive students begin to tolerate sounds, sights and/or touch opening up positive interaction with the world, shifting from an inner state of constant fear, distrust and concern to calm, wonder and joy



To support smooth & effective implementation of therapy services, the following infrastructure upgrades were made.

Sensory Path

This is a pathway that has 8 different materials filled up in 8 segments –each material having a different sensory feel –Like sand, pebbles, grass, marbles etc. Students are made to walk barefoot in this path as a part of therapy to help integrate their sensory pathways.



In addition to being a speech room, this room doubles up as a place to soothe and calm our students with soft lighting, audio and sensory stimulation.

The sensory park and sensory room is an important therapy requirement for our students, where the stimuli will help in regulating sensory processing and behavior of our students, who often display a hypo (avoiding) or hyper (seeking) sensory behavior.



Assessment camp at YMCA

In our efforts to reach out to people with autism, Swabodhini conducted a free assessment camp at YMCA Special school at Nandanam in April 2018


Therapists from Swabodhini conducted speech, OT and IQ assessment for more than 15 students and shared the assessment report and counselled the parents.

Vocational skill training

The Vocational skills training program at Swabodhini is developed with a job role as the end goal and is structured accordingly to provide intensive skill training to mainstream the students. We help to train our students as well as identify employment opportunities. This training is targeted to the "young adults" in the age group of 16 years and above in the following areas:

- Retail skills training -Swayam Shop (identification of items, weighing, packing, sorting, billing etc.)
- Office administration skills training (Filing, Scanning and Photo Copying documents etc.)
- Computer skills training (MS Office, Photo shop, Internet etc.)
- Culinary skills training (identification of ingredients, chopping, peeling of vegetables, fireless cooking, table setting etc.)

Vocational updates 2017-18



This year, Swabodhini drew up a detailed skill matrix for every student where we identified and tracked the possible skill sets of each student according to the activities defined in the curriculum. Mapping the skills of each student facilitated improved training & helped match the skills with internship and placement opportunities.

The objective of this 18 month vocational training progam is to provide a platform for intensive training which creates opportunities to eligible students for open employment / internship. This academic year, we had 26 students who underwent vocational training at Swabodhini, which is a 44% increase over last year.

Our students are also trained at creating beautiful hand painted divas and making paper bags. We were able to cater to bulk corporate orders for our vocational products. Also, with social media marketing, we managed a 73% increase in the sale of our vocational products.



Swayam Shop is Swabodhini's own retail store where we provide real time retail skills training to student batches. One of the key highlights of the retail skills training is that we moved the shop outside the school premises. By moving the shop out of school, we were able to take in more admissions –for both the school as well as for the training in retail skills. A batch of 8 students underwent retail skills training at the shop.

We appointed a full time person to take charge of the shop this year. With an increase in the customer base & the number of mobile grocery shops, we were able to provide sustained training opportunity for our students.



Vocational training Infrastructure additions

We upgraded our model kitchen with brand new culinary equipment –induction stove, microwave oven, mixer, grinder etc. Culinary skills training is one of the three streams of vocational training at Swabodhini and students are now trained to use these equipment effectively. Thanks to the generous support of Lennox India Pvt Ltd., the students have started learning to make dosa and idly batter.

Vocational Outreach programs

Swabodhini set up stalls in various places, where we displayed our vocational products. These stalls are a great platform for creating autism awareness and also helps people understand what Swabodhini does in the space of autism and special education.





Internships & employment

Swabodhini provides internship / placement opportunities for eligible students and we are proud to say that some of our students work in major corporates in Chennai. Our 30 year experience in the field, has helped us in supporting the lives of more than 500 students with autism, through education, skill training and therapy

We are proud to say that two of our students were placed in open employment

- Mr. Mahesh Ram has taken up full time employment at Shankar Netralaya where he is a data entry operator.
- Mr. Venkat Naraendar is working at The Indian Terrain Warehouse. He is currently assigned to the e-commerce division, where he helps in dispatch of online orders.

We have had three internships during the year

- Mr. Kannan, our vocational student, interned at Writer's Café, Royapettah. He was assigned the task of folding napkins & arranging the books at their bookstore.
- Mr. Kaustav Chakraborty interned at Guru Nanak College. He assisted with inventory management of all the 47 classrooms in Guru Nanak College, Velachery
- Mr. Vishwanath is interned at MAGC Consultants where he scans their journals and photocopied and filed their invoices thereby helping in digitalizing their records.













Parent Workshop

As a part of the "Keep In Touch" initiative, Swabodhini organizes workshops and camps for parents, where we invite an expert to talk about relevant topic, focusing on giving insights on how to handle their wards better at home.

Swabodhini invited Mr. P. R. Krishnamurthy, to talk on "Understanding behavioural challenges and handling the same (including adolescents)". Mr. Krishnamurthy, who is an M.Phil in rehabilitation psychology, works as a Rehabilitation Psychologist & Behavioural Specialist at National Institute of Employment of Person with Multiple Disability (NIEPMD), Chennai.

The program was very well received by the parents, where Mr. Krishnamurthy explained in simple and effective manner on how to identify what triggers behavior issues in students with autism and the various methods to handle the behavior issues.

The session was very interactive where parents got many of their doubts clarified by the expert.



Post graduate students from the Department of Public Health Dentistry of Saveetha Dental College, under the guidance of Dr. Shyamala Chandrasekar visited the school and did a free dental checkup for all our students. They also gave a small talk to our special educators on oral health care. Complete diagnosis and also follow up measures were communicated to the parents by the School to ensure good dental health of their wards.





Excursions and field trips take the learning out of the classroom & infuse a lot of enthusiasm in our students. Many are the therapeutic benefits of snow! The students were taken to Snow world in VGP Amusement Park as part of a sensory experience where they had a fun time.

Playing in the snow is an activity which provides excellent deep pressure and a proprioceptive input which is an internal sense of body awareness. It produces a calming effect on the students



Students were taught the importance of celebrating festivals and their significance during the year as we celebrated important festivals like Independence Day, Gokulashtami, Ganesh Chaturti, Navaratri, Children's day and Pongal at the school with much gusto. The students were happy to dress up for each of the occasions.

Project Day

Project day was also celebrated at the school in November. The Primary students set up a mock dental camp, Pre-vocational students did a role play on safety. The girls from the Vocational class sold their hand painted diyas and the culinary students set up a live salad bar. It sure was an innovative, fun and interactive way of showcasing the learning of our students to the parents and guests.

Outside events

Sports Meets

A student's social life is as important as their academic life, for their development. Getting involved in activities outside of school can help these students see the world outside school and this improves their social skills as a result. The students had an opportunity to showcase their prowess at sports at the DDRO Sports Meet, Perambur Sports Meet as well as the event organized by Krida Sports where they won prizes.



Talent Shows



The students also showcased their talents at "Shining Star' a Cognizant Outreach program, the Neeta Talent show, "Punnagai" a show conducted by the Rotaract Club and the DDRO Culturals.

Fund raising events

This year, we had 3 fund raising events out of which 2 were musical concerts –organised by Pioneer Music Gym & Swarag's Pon Malai Pozhudu by Mr. Rajaram and Mr. Sriraman.

Every year, Swabodhini participates as a registered charity with the United Way of Chennai for Chennai's biggest running event – The Wipro Chennai Marathon.



The culmination of all the efforts of the students, teachers and special educators for the entire year were showcased at our Annual day, another important event at Swabodhini. We ensure that every child has as role on stage and it is a proud moment for the parents and teachers alike when the students exhibit their talents.

The 29th annual event was held on 18th March, 2018. All our 60 students performed on stage in a theme based cultural event, called "Putham Pudhu boomi Vendum –The colorful World of Spectrum". Held at the Muthamizh Peravai Auditorium, Adyar, the event was attended by more than 400 guests, which included parents, donors and sponsors, students and staff from other special schools and other well-wishers.

The cultural event had 10 programs, where students took the audience through a journey into their world, where they depicted what it meant to be autistic and how their world is as beautiful and colourful and joyful as ours. They gave the message of acceptance & celebration of their differences through the theme of colours.

The event was presided over by Mr. Aditya Krishna, Chairman and Managing Director of Saksoft Ltd. He addressed the audience on the importance of inclusion and how it is important that people with autism should be integrated with mainstream society.

In house staff training program

Swabodhini believes in constant skill upgradation of our teachers. In association with our consultant for special education, we conducted more than 7 workshops for our special educators, teacher assistant and support staff on how to improve their communication with students, innovative teaching methodologies, better understanding of their own emotions and so on. These trainings have been very effective and are showing results in the overall improvement of our students.

Job Manual

We rolled out our Job Manual –with detailed roles and responsibilities for every job function at Swabodhini. A culmination of tremendous efforts by our director, trustees and consultants; this manual is a big stride in the direction of making Swabodhini a professionally run organization. This manual aims to bring a lot of clarity in the roles and responsibilities of management staff, reporting templates and streamlining of functions.

This is in line with Swabodhini's commitment to bring in professionalism in all its functions.

Staff Training

The leadership team, underwent a leadership training by expert executive coaches at the start of 2018.

On the 23rd of April, Ms. Lakshmi Satish from Mirra Charitable trust anchored a workshop for the staff of Swabodhini (Primary, Prevocational and Vocational). The aim of the workshop was to reflect on the past year, goals accomplished, issues faced, and to discuss feedback received from parents during PRR (Progress Review Report) review meetings. A concrete set of action items for the next year was the take away from this meeting.

Outreach by Staff

Our staff participated in the following events on behalf of the school.

Dream Madras 2017

Three of our staff volunteered at the Dream Madras 2017 event conducted by United Way of Chennai on 24th August. Dream Madras 2017 – is an interschool competition where students from 110 schools set up their exhibits on the topic Safe Streets. The event was conducted at Anna University.

Workshop at Indian Terrain



Swabodhini conducted an autism sensitization workshop at Indian Terrain where our head of education Ms Sudha Kartik addressed more than 70 employees.

Autism Round Table Conference

Ms Sudha Karthik was also a key speaker at the Autism Round table Conference organized by the Commandur foundation, in which she addressed the gathering of parents and special educators on internship mediation —the role of job coach and counselor. The event was attended by parents of children with autism, special educators from various special schools, employers who have employed people with autism, who came together to share their thoughts on how adults with autism can be given opportunities to lead an independent life with gainful employment.

Bill Gates Foundation presentation

We are especially proud that Swabodhini in collaboration with IIT Madras, had applied for a grant under the "Grand Challenges Exploration—India", funded by Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. The proposal was for creation of a non-invasive device that will predict the onset of behavior changes in individuals with autism by analyzing the ectodermal activity.

Out of the 237 applicants, Swabodhini was one of the 20 finalists – and the only NGO that presented our case. It was a wonderful platform to highlight the challenges of autism and urge for more research in finding solutions to manage behavior issues in individuals with autism. However, Swabodhini was not in the final 5 proposals that was selected.

New beginnings

Guru Nanak College Centre

We are very thankful for a great opportunity that has come our way to start a new center within the Guru Nanak college campus at Velachery, in association with Guru Nanak Education Society.

Guru Nanak college is providing us the infrastructure support and Swabodhini will run the special school. In the spirit of inclusion, our students are privileged to share space with regular college goers and have access to the library, sports ground and computer lab. This is an opportunity to reach out to more students in that geographical area and we are now open for admissions.

It is a proud year for Swabodhini to be able to undertake this expansion. We look forward to the support of all and the blessings of Almighty to make this a grand success.

TNSDC

We are very happy to announce that Swabodhini is now a registered and approved Training Provider under Tamil Nadu Skill Development Corporation (TNSDC) for imparting skill training in hospitality, retail and ICT.

We will be commencing training batches from June 2018, where students who undergo the training program will be assessed and certified by inspectors from TNSDC. We are proud to say that Swabodhini is the first special school to be certified by TNSDC to provide a certificate course to students with Autism and related challenges.


Research study with IIT Madras
